A MESSAGE FROM SUPERVISOR MAHAN



Dear Fellow Colonie Resident,

I am honored Colonie has once again been named "Best Suburb" in the Times Union's Readers' Poll. That's five times in a row we've been voted the best suburban community! What a great recognition for our beautiful Town and our wonderful quality of life.

We were also honored by the NYS Department of Environmental Conservation this spring for our commitment to urban forestry. And earlier this year, we adopted the NYS Climate Smart Communities Pledge, underscoring our commitment to reducing greenhouse gas emissions.

Speaking of reducing greenhouse emissions, the Town is just now finalizing a project that will allow

us to use hydroelectric electricity generation to earn green energy credits and offset a significant portion of our energy usage. It will also help stabilize the Town's energy costs for the next twenty years.

In April, we began live streaming Town Board meetings. The videos are also posted online, and it's easy to view discussion on items of special interest. (To view meetings – both live and pre-recorded – go to the "Meetings and Agendas" tab at the top of the home page, scroll to "Town Board," then click on "Agenda," and go to the "Town Board Meetings" portal.)

We all know we live in a very safe community, but I am pleased to note that in 2017 serious crime in Colonie decreased overall by 6.7 percent, in spite of a five percent increase in calls for service! I know we are all grateful to the Colonie Police Department for working so hard to keep us safe.

As I write this, it seems spring has not quite arrived. Nevertheless, we are busy readying our parks and athletic fields for the warm days and evenings that are sure to come. We're excited to be starting construction on our beautiful new splash pad in the Colonie Town Park, and we're working hard to revitalize our pocket parks with new playground equipment, fencing, and landscaping, among other improvements.

Finally, I am truly honored to have been re-elected as your Town Supervisor. I look forward to continuing the great progress we've made working together.

TOWN RECEIVING \$4.4 MILLION FOR IMPORTANT PROJECTS

Colonie has recently secured \$4.4 million in various grants that are helping the Town move forward with a number of important initiatives, including infrastructure improvement and critical redevelopment and quality of life projects.

Most recently, the Town was awarded a \$1 million Restore New York Grant for demolition of the old Tobin Packing plant. Demolition is the essential first step in plans by a private developer to revitalize the property for an exciting new mix of retail and residential uses.

Supporting much-needed redevelopment of the Lincoln Avenue Corridor, the Town's Planning and Economic Development Department is using a \$269,000 Brownfield Opportunity Grant to study redevelopment options there.

Last year, the Town received a \$175,000 grant from the NYS Attorney General's Office to tackle the issue of abandoned, or "zombie," properties and help homeowners prevent foreclosure. These efforts are still ongoing.

A \$960,000 NYS Water Infrastructure Improvement grant is now helping to defray the Town's \$1.6 million share of a project to establish emergency water connections between the Colonie and Albany water systems. (See page 4.)

Much-needed updating and beautification of our Town Library has begun. While we expect to commit \$3 to \$4 million of Town funds for renovation, we are extremely grateful to Colonie Assemblyman Phil Steck for arranging an additional \$1 million for renovation of the library's lobby and entryway.

Assemblyman Steck also arranged for \$500,000 to fund capital improvements to the Town's Municipal Training Center, a regional training resource where thousands of the region's first responders train every year. In addition, through his efforts, the Town will also receive special funding of \$250,000 for improvements to the bike path and \$125,000 to construct a much-needed new pavilion in the Town Park.

Finally, the Town is excited about a future \$125,000 grant, also from Assemblyman Steck, to fund a new playground at the south end of The Crossings.

TOWN TO HOST FORECLOSURE WORKSHOP

Struggling with mortgage payments? You're not alone. Each month, over 1,000 Capital Region residents receive a notice of intent to foreclose from their mortgage lender.

Thankfully, expert help is available at no cost through NYS's Homeowner Protection Program, and on Saturday, May 12, the Town will host a foreclosure prevention information workshop at the Town Library from 10 am to 2 pm.

The session will provide a brief overview of the foreclosure process and homeowner options as well as an opportunity to meet one-onone with a well-trained foreclosure prevention housing advisor and/ or attorney.

It will also present information about the NYS Mortgage Assistance Program, which provides zero percent interest mortgage loans to eligible New York homeowners at risk of foreclosure. Funds can help pay off mortgage or property tax arrears or help get a loan modification. Although no monthly installments are due on the loan, the full principal amount is due upon sale or refinance of the home. Homeowners must be able to demonstrate an ability to afford their housing payment after receiving assistance.

Tips for homeowners in foreclosure include:

- Seek assistance early in the foreclosure process.
- Be sure to attend a court-hosted Settlement Conference.
- If your lender refuses to accept your mortgage payment, save that payment. Funds will help with future negotiations.

NEW MEDICARE CARDS BEING ISSUED

Beginning April 1, Medicare began issuing new Medicare cards, which no longer display Social Security Numbers (SSNs). Instead, the new cards carry an 11-digit identifier that's a mix of numbers and letters. The new cards will NOT change your coverage in any way.

Your new card will be mailed to you automatically, and you can begin using the new card as soon as you receive it. There is no need to confirm any personal information with Medicare. New cards will be issued through April 2019.

If someone calls asking for your Medicare number and offers to send you a new card, it is a scam. Never give information to anyone over the phone. If you receive such a call, you should report it immediately to the NY Senior Medicare Patrol at 877-678-4697.

TOWN REPLACING OUTDATED WATER MAINS

The Town's Latham Water District is now installing almost a mile of new water mains along sections of Route 9 and Maxwell Road, replacing aging 1930s-era mains increasingly prone to breaks.

Along Maxwell Road, 3,000 feet of new 12-inch ductile iron water main will replace an existing 6"cast iron main running from Old Niskayuna Road east to Hills Road.

Similarly, 2,150 feet of new ductile iron water main and high-density polyethylene (HDPE) main will be laid along Route 9 from Town Hall to Campus View Drive and from Spring Street to Turner Lane, replacing an increasingly unreliable 10" cast iron main.

An additional project to replace 3,800 feet of water main along Route 9 from Maxwell Road to Old Loudon Road is expected to begin later this summer.

The new mains will increase water system reliability, pressure, and fire flows to residents and decrease unplanned shutdowns caused by water main breaks. Total cost for the projects is \$3.33 million.

By the end of 2018, the Town will have invested more than \$18 million in strategic improvements to its drinking water system and \$14 million for its sewer system.

"I want to thank Latham Water District Superintendent John Frazer and his staff for the tremendous job they do every day in delivering millions of gallons of fresh, pure drinking water to our residents and in planning so well to meet the Town's water needs far, far into the future," said Town Supervisor Paula A. Mahan.

WATER GRANT SUPPORTS SHARED SERVICES

The Town was recently awarded a \$960,000 NYS Water Infrastructure Improvement Act grant to help it move forward with an important drinking water infrastructure improvement at the Latham Water District.

The grant will help defray the Town's \$1.6 million share of a project to establish an important interconnection between the Town of Colonie and the City of Albany water systems. Total project cost is \$3.2 million, with the cost being shared equally by each municipality.

When the interconnection is complete, Colonie and Albany will be able to provide each other with much more efficient and cost-effective emergency back-up water systems. Completion is expected in mid-2019. Questions can be directed to the DPW/Division of Latham Water at 518-783-2750.

SUPERVISOR DELIVERS 2018 STATE OF THE TOWN ADDRESS

Supervisor Paula A. Mahan delivered her annual State of the Town address earlier this year at a Town Board meeting and also before the Albany-Colonie Chamber. Key points are summarized below. The entire address is posted at: www.colonie.org.

- First, I am honored to begin my sixth term as your Town Supervisor. I see many more great things for Colonie.
- When I think about Colonie, all I can say is "Look how far we've come!" The beauty is that we've retained our hometown feeling.
- Colonie was ranked "Best Suburban Community" in the 2017 Times Union's Readers Poll. (Note: Colonie was also named "Best Suburb" in the 2018 poll, for the fifth time in a row!)
- In 2017, we were named a "Tree City USA" by the National Arbor Day Foundation.
- Our EMS Department earned the American Heart Association's 2017 Mission Lifeline Gold Award.
- In 2017, we had an overall decrease of 6.7 percent in crime a three percent drop in serious crime and a ten percent drop in less serious crime.
- In a new Siena poll, 95 percent of respondents rated Colonie as a good or excellent place to live; 86 percent said property taxes were "about right."
- For the seventh year in a row, our 2018 budget meets the NYS Tax Levy Cap.

- A new project to use Hydro Electric will offset a significant portion of our electricity usage.
- By the end of 2018, we'll have invested \$18 million to improve our drinking water system and \$14 million for our sewer system.
- We're now exploring revenue options for open-space acquisition.
- We've begun construction of a beautiful new splash pad at the Town Park on Schermerhorn Road.
- We've committed \$3 to \$4 million for renovations at the Town Library. We are grateful to Colonie Assemblyman Phil Steck for arranging another \$1 million for library renovation.
- Through Assemblyman Steck, we will also receive \$500,000 for improvements to our Municipal Training Center, \$250,000 for bike path improvements, \$125,000 for a new pavilion at the Town Park, and \$125,000 for a new playground at the south end of The Crossings.
- We're really looking forward to continuing our progress in 2018 and keeping the Town of Colonie the best place to call home.

YARD WASTE RECYCLING PROGRAM 2018



After November 2, the Town will continue to collect yard waste, but not on the regular weekly schedule. Unscheduled curbside collection will continue through December 7, weather permitting.

Program Guidelines

For ease of handling, we prefer yard waste to be packed in biodegradable bags. They can be purchased at local supermarkets, hardware stores, and home centers.

Yard waste may also be placed in reusable containers no larger than 32 gallons in volume and weighing no more than 40 pounds. It is no longer necessary to identify reusable containers with compostable yard waste stickers purchased from the Town.

Residents may also bring compostable yard waste at no charge to the Landfill compost facility at 1319 Loudon Road, Cohoes, during normal business hours (M-F, 7 am – 3 pm; Saturdays, 7am-Noon, through June); and in July, August, and September during Summer Hours (M-F, 7 am-2 pm; Saturdays 7 am-Noon.)

Residents may pick up free compost beginning May 7.

Note: Compost is not recommended for vegetable gardens, but can be used as mulch, a soil conditioner, to establish a lawn, or as an ornamental plant potting soil.

Holiday Collection

When a legal holiday falls on a collection day, pick up for ALL fire districts may occur on another day during the week.

ACCEPTABLE YARD WASTE

- Lawn Clippings
- Leaves
- Plant Debris
- Hay
- Branches & brush up to 3 inches in diameter and 4 feet in length, tied with string in manageable bundles (no wire)

UNACCEPTABLE YARD WASTE

- Bags or Containers over 40 lbs. in weight or 32 gallons in volume
- Yard waste in plastic bags (including orange pumpkin bags)
- Wreaths (because of wire)
- Branches or brush not bundled with twine or in biodegradable bags
- Branches stuffed in containers
- Yard waste containing rocks, sod, or dirt
- Yard waste frozen in reusable containers
- Treated wood
- Construction/demolition debris
- Non-organic material, including metal of any type

PRACTICE POLLUTION PREVENTION

Stormwater runoff is rain that falls on roofs, lawns, or paved areas, and is carried away by a system of stormwater pipes or culverts and ditches. As it flows over the land surface, it can be contaminated by debris, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants. This untreated water is then discharged directly into the water bodies we use for swimming, fishing, and drinking water.

What you can do to help:

- Recycle used motor oil
- Participate in Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day
- Use hazardous substances in the smallest amounts possible

Please recycle or properly dispose of household products that contain chemicals, such as insecticides, pesticides, paint, solvents, used motor oil and other fluids. Don't pour them onto the ground or into storm drains!

ACCEPTABLE MATERIALS

Remember the "best method" for disposal of unrestricted pesticides is proper use. If not banned, restricted, or outdated, use according to directions or give to a friend to use.
